OUTSTANDING TEACHING AND INSTRUCTIONAL CREATIVITY AWARD

Phani Tej Adidam is a professor and chair of marketing and entrepreneurship and the director of the Center for International Business Initiatives at UNO’s College of Business Administration. As a Fulbright scholar and current Fulbright specialist, he brings a wealth of global experience and insight to his roles. Dr. Adidam holds a bachelor of commerce (honors) from Banaras Hindu University, India, an MBA from the Institute of Management Technology, India, and a Ph.D. from Texas Tech University. He was honored with the Distinguished Alumni Award from the Faculty of Commerce at Banaras Hindu University, India. His dedication to teaching has earned him numerous teaching awards at UNO. Dr. Adidam teaches sales, brand, marketing, and management strategies in the MBA, Executive MBA, and BSBA programs. His innovative approach has transformed key programs at UNO, including the Executive MBA and MBA programs. He has introduced dual-degree programs that have expanded UNO’s global footprint, attracting international students and enriching the academic environment. Beyond traditional degree programs, Dr. Adidam excels

in engaging a wide range of stakeholders. He has conducted executive education sessions, workshops, and summits, benefiting countless executives, faculty, and students. His mentorship extends to entrepreneurs, and he actively supports industry associations and nonprofits with his expertise in branding, digital marketing, and customer engagement. Dr. Adidam’s contributions to global education are unparalleled. He has taught at 12 prestigious international business schools and created global teaching opportunities for his colleagues. His leadership in international student immersion trips and the innovative Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) approach has provided enriching, cross-cultural experiences for students. Through global capstone projects and education abroad programs, he has prepared students for impactful careers worldwide, enhancing their international competencies. Dr. Adidam’s research appears in several leading academic journals – *Journal of Marketing*; *Journal of International Marketing*; *Journal of Marketing Management*; among others.





PAUL DENTON

Paul W. Denton is an associate professor in the Department of Biology, teaching undergraduate and upper-level courses, and leads a research group focusing on immunotherapy. His passion lies in engaging students in STEM. He earned his Ph.D. in immunology from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. He is the faculty leader of a UNO biology-based volunteer journal club that focuses undergraduate students' efforts on the critical reading and comprehension of primary scientific literature related to biomedicine. The undergraduate student-researchers in his immunobiology research

group perform U.S. National Institutes of Health- and Nebraska Research Initiative-funded projects using immunotherapies to boost human immune responses against diseased cells such as malignant or infected cells.

Denton also engages students through several STEM education-related grants on which he serves as principal investigator or co-principal investigator. These awards support scholarships for STEM majors and support community engagement efforts by bringing UNO undergraduate student mentors into Omaha Public Schools as after-school STEM program providers.



JODY KEISNER

Jody Keisner is an associate professor in the Department of English with a specialization in creative nonfiction. She has contributed curriculum to the Department of English, medical humanities, master of arts in critical and creative thinking, and women's and gender studies. Her research and teaching reflect her interests in women's issues and the intersections of gender, health, and society, among other areas of study.

She is the author of *Under My Bed and Other Essays* and the recipient of a 2024 Individual Arts Fellowship from the Nebraska Arts Council. Her work appears in the *Los Angeles Review of Books*, *Fourth Genre*, *Women's Studies*, and many other places. Keisner is the editor-in-chief of UNO's international journal of health humanities and creative nonfiction, *The Linden Review*.



RYAN RISKOWSKI

Ryan Riskowski, Ph.D., has an academic work focus on developing our understanding of the physics of biomolecules at the nanoscale and generating new applications for nanoscale sensors and molecular actuators. As a fellow of the National Strategic Research Institute, he contributes to several working groups whose aim is to translate academic research into modern applications. Riskowski has mentored an array of students in formal research projects in the areas of physics, mathematics, engineering, chemistry, and biology.

In the classroom, he integrates new approaches from evidence-based practices to increase student engagement and learning and has implemented new curricula for introductory and upper-level classes, emphasizing peer learning and student-led inquiry. Most recently, after introducing student-created research experiences into his upper-level medical physics classes, two student-created projects have transitioned into full-fledged research projects in the lab.



XIAOYAN CHENG

Xiaoyan Cheng, Ph.D., is a professor in the School of Accounting. She earned her Ph.D. in accounting from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Since joining UNO in 2009, Cheng has taught principles of financial accounting, intermediate financial accounting, advanced financial accounting, and graduate seminar in financial statement analysis. Her research interests include corporate governance, shareholder activism, and Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) regulatory

compliance and reporting. Her research can be found in *Auditing: A Journal of Practice & Theory*, *Advances in Accounting*, *Review of Quantitative Finance and Accounting*, *Research in Accounting Regulation*, and *Global Finance Journal*. As the faculty advisor of Gamma Kappa Chapter of UNO Beta Alpha Psi, Cheng connects students with peers and industry leaders, while developing their business skillset.

Todd Robinson, Ph.D., is an assistant professor in the Writer's Workshop, where he serves as coordinator of the Spring Reading Series. His work has appeared in 60 literary magazines, including *North American Review*, *Rattle*, and *The Adroit Journal*. He is the recipient of an Academy of American Poets Prize and was a finalist for

the Maureen Egan Literary Exchange Award. He is a sought-after master of ceremonies and workshop leader for area literary events, including Omaha Lit Fest and the Bemis Art Center. Robinson is a member of UNO's Medical Humanities Faculty and served as a founding member of the Seven Doctors Project at UNMC. He is a regular book reviewer for KVNO, a current nominee for Nebraska State Poet, and has won many teaching awards.



PHILIP NORDNESS
College of Education, Health,
and Human Sciences
Special Education and
Communication Disorders

Philip Nordness, Ph.D., is a Peter Kiewit Distinguished Professor of Special Education. Nordness earned his Ph.D. in special education from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. In 2012, he and his colleague Beth Leader-Janssen, Ph.D. developed one of the first completely online programs in the College of Education, Health, and Human Sciences. The master's degree in special education with a concentration behavioral disorders has resulted in a significant increase in graduate enrollment that continues to this day. Recently, he has been working

on interdisciplinary collaboration to meet the emotional and behavioral needs of children with disabilities and those who might be at risk of school failure. His work on interdisciplinary collaboration resulted in a \$1.2 million federal personnel preparation grant in which he served as a co-principal investigator. Nordness teaches courses on behavior modification, research methods, and introductory special education. Prior to getting his Ph.D., he spent three years teaching children with emotional and behavioral disorders in Minneapolis, Minnesota.



AMY HANSON

Gerontology

Amy Hanson, Ph.D., teaches several aging courses for both undergraduate and graduate students, including introduction to gerontology, programs and services for older adults, psychology of adult development and baby boomers and the 21st century. Many of her courses include service learning and field experiences and she has been awarded several teaching grants, including a grant focused on student engagement with older adults in the Omaha community. She has partnered with other departments on campus to

bring gerontological education to a broader range of students including honors students, exploratory studies, and medical humanities. Her primary teaching and research interests include baby boomers, retirement and volunteerism, and older adults within faith communities. Dr. Hanson is the author of the book, *Baby Boomers and Beyond: Tapping the Ministry Talents and Passions of Adults over 50*, and she is frequently asked to speak, write, and consult with local, national, and international organizations on a variety of aging issues.



CLARENCE WATERS

Clarence Waters, Ph.D., is the Aaron Douglas Professor of the Durham School of Architectural Engineering and Construction, part of the College of Engineering at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL). He served as director of UNL Architectural Engineering for six years. He was the head of the Department of Architectural Engineering and Construction Science at Kansas State University for four years. He is currently or has been licensed in 21 states and received two International

Lighting Design Awards of Merit. Waters is a fellow of the Architectural Engineering Institute (AEI) where he served as president and a member of the Board of Governors. He has also been involved with the Illuminating Engineering Society of North America, (IESNA) where he has chaired and served on many technical committees. His scholarly activities are in lighting, lighting control, and power distribution systems for buildings.



PEI-CHI HUANG

Pei-Chi Huang, Ph.D., is an associate professor in the Department of Computer Science. She earned her Ph.D. in computer science from the University of Texas at Austin. Huang's research focuses on cyber-physical systems with machine learning, particularly in real-time computing, scheduling algorithms, and wireless communication/networking systems. She develops advanced algorithms for reliable system responses in critical applications like industrial control systems and autonomous vehicles. Her work also enhances wireless

connectivity and improves network resilience and data transmission. She applies her research to smart infrastructure, autonomous systems, and internet of things (IoT), offering solutions that impact real-world technologies. In teaching, she emphasizes hands-on education, integrating theory with practice to prepare students for real-world challenges. Her commitment to both research and teaching advances computer science and shapes the next generation of technology leaders.



EUGENIO DI STEFANO

Eugenio Di Stefano is a professor of Latin American literature and culture in the Department of World Languages and Literature and a member of the Office of Latino/Latin American Studies (OLLAS) at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. He has published articles on the politics of aesthetic form in contemporary Latin American cultural production in journals such as *Modern Language Notes*, *Revista de estudios hispánicos*, and *Nonsite*.

He is the author of the book, *The Vanishing Frame: Latin American Theory and Culture in the Post dictatorial Era* (University of Texas Press). He is currently working on a book manuscript titled *Dead Time: Capturing the Forms of the Latin American Present*. He is also a founding editor of *Forma*, an online journal dedicated to rethinking contemporary Latin American culture and theory.

Dr. Yanhui Zhao, Ph.D., is an associate professor of marketing at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. His primary research interests fall within the domain of marketing strategy, including brand management, sales management, and inter-organizational relationships. His research has appeared in top-tier marketing journals such as the *Journal of the Academy of Marketing Science*, *Journal of Business Ethics*, *Journal of Service Research*, *Journal of International Marketing*, *Industrial Marketing Management*, and *Journal of Personal Selling and*

Sales Management. His research has been quoted multiple times by news outlets such as CNN Money and BBC News. He is a recipient of the James M. Comer Award for the Best Contribution to Selling and Sales Management Theory. In 2021, 2022, and 2024, Dr. Zhao received UNO Department of Marketing and Entrepreneurship's Distinguished Professor Awards for his achievements in research, teaching, and service. He earned his Ph.D. in marketing from Michigan State University.

Kristina Stamatis is an assistant professor of teacher education at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. Her research explores possibilities for dismantling oppressive systems through community engagement, identity development, and storytelling in formal and informal learning spaces. Prior to completing her Ph.D. at the University of Colorado Boulder in learning sciences and human development, Stamatis was a high school

English teacher and reading specialist. She has co-designed storytelling practices with other educators throughout her career, most recently collaborating with colleagues at the Denver Writing Project to reimagine the possibilities for intergenerational storytelling in schools. Her work has appeared in the *Reading Research Quarterly*, *Teaching and Teacher Education*, and *The New Educator*.



MARK GILBERT

Mark Gilbert is an associate professor of art and art history at the University of Nebraska at Omaha's School of the Arts, where he is participating faculty on UNO's medical humanities program. Gilbert graduated from Glasgow School of Art in 1991. He earned his Ph.D. in 2014 from the University of Nebraska Medical Center. As an artist, teacher, and researcher, he has worked on a number of high profile art-based research projects using portraiture to illuminate patient and caregiver experience of illness, recovery and care. These studies include *Saving Faces* at the Royal London

Hospital and *Portraits of Care* at the University of Nebraska Medical Center. His work has been exhibited widely in venues across Europe and the US, including the National Portrait Gallery in London. Gilbert's most recent project, *Portrait of Covid-19*, used portraiture to explore the experience of healthcare workers during the pandemic. The project recruited participants from Omaha, New York, Houston, and Washington. The resultant collection is permanently displayed in the American Medical Association head office in Chicago.



TARA RICHARDS

Tara N. Richards, Ph.D., is the David Scott Diamond Alumni Professor of Public Affairs and Community Service in the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice (SCCJ) and co-director of SCCJ’s Victimology and Victim Studies Research Lab. Her research focuses on prevention, intervention, and responses to sexual assault, domestic/intimate partner violence, child abuse, and neglect. She has published more than 100 peer-reviewed journal articles and book chapters and has won more than \$3 million

in competitive grants and contracts to support her research. Richards also coordinates the Nebraska Victim Assistance Academy, the state’s accredited 40-hour training certification for victim service providers and allied professionals. She serves on the state’s Domestic Violence Intervention Program State Standards Committee, Douglas County’s Domestic Violence Community Response Team, and Sexual Assault Response Team.



YULIYA LIERLER

Yuliya Lierler is a professor in the Department of Computer Science at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. She held an appointment to the Cheryl Prewett Diamond Professorship from 2020 to 2023. She is the director of the Knowledge Representation and Natural Language Understanding Lab since joining UNO in 2012. Her research contributions and interests are in the field of artificial intelligence (AI), especially in the areas of knowledge representation and logic programming/answer set programming – a prominent subfield of artificial intelligence. Her papers appear in renowned AI venues such as AAAI

Conference on Artificial Intelligence, International Joint Conference on Artificial Intelligence, as well as *Artificial Intelligence* and *Theory and Practice of Logic Programming* journals. She has published more than 65 peer-reviewed conference and journal papers throughout her career. In 2020, the Association of Logic Programming nominated and then elected her as an Executive Committee Board Member. Yuliya Lierler served as a Computing Innovation Fellow postdoctoral researcher at the University of Kentucky for two years after completing her Ph.D. in computer science at the University of Texas at Austin in 2010.

Amy Schindler is an associate professor in the Dr. C.C. and Mabel L. Criss Library. She has worked as director of archives and special collections at UNO since 2014. Her primary focus in librarianship is increasing access to archival materials and expanding the scope of UNO’s distinctive collections. Her research interests include community outreach utilizing archival materials, exhibits, community archives, and the evolution of archival practice. Schindler was one of the founders of the Queer Omaha Archives in 2016, and continues to lead efforts to collect, preserve, and share Omaha and Nebraska LGBTQIA2S+ history.

She was previously University Archivist at the College of William and Mary and Curator of Manuscripts at the University at Albany, State University of New York. She has held leadership positions in the Society of American Archivists, Mid-Atlantic Regional Archives Conference, and other archives organizations. She earned master’s degrees in history and library and information science with an archives concentration from the University of Wisconsin–Milwaukee (2001) and a bachelor’s degree in history with a certificate in Asian American Studies from the University of Wisconsin–Madison (1998).

Michele Desmarais, Ph.D., is a Métis, Dakota, and European poet and scholar from Canada. She is an associate professor in religious studies and a teaching faculty member in Native American studies and medical humanities. Desmarais was the founding director of the Medical Humanities program at UNO. From 2014-2017, she developed and facilitated the first

Religious Studies internships. In 2017, the project of her FUSE grant mentee, Britny Cordera, was chosen for the Council of Undergraduate Research’s event in Washington D.C.—one of only two humanities- or arts-based projects selected in the nation that year. She was a recipient of the College of Arts and Science’s Outstanding Teaching Award in 2008 and in 2023.

In addition to his work as a part-time instructor, Ashley Harlow is a child and adolescent psychologist at Children’s Nebraska. Applying his background in behavioral health, Harlow has developed and taught undergraduate and graduate courses in the College of Business Administration with a strong psychological component, such as skills for leadership

and managing change and innovation. Collaboration, inclusion, and innovation have always been professional priorities, which has led to committee work to improve the experience of adjunct faculty, revising accreditation processes, and integrating competency-based education into his courses.

Jodi Benenson, Ph.D., is an associate professor and the master of public administration program chair in the School of Public Administration. Her primary research and teaching interests include civic engagement, nonprofit organizations, social policy, and social equity. Previously, she served as the 2023-24 Fulbright Canada Research Chair in Governance and Public Administration at the Centre on Governance at the University

of Ottawa and as the Academic Director for the U.S. Department of State’s Young Southeast Asian Leaders Initiative (YSEALI) Institute on Civic Engagement. Her research has been published in a variety of academic and practice-based outlets, and she is engaged with several local, national, and international organizations that center civic engagement and representation.



ALEXEY KAMENSKIY

DISTINGUISHED RESEARCH OR CREATIVE ACTIVITY AWARD

Alexey V. Kamenskiy, Ph.D., is a professor and chair of the Department of Biomechanics at UNO and the director of the Center for Cardiovascular Research in Biomechanics (CRiB). He earned his Ph.D. in engineering mechanics from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. His research focuses on developing efficient and practical solutions for vascular problems through the study of vascular mechanophysiology, mechanobiology, and aging. Dr. Kamenskiy leads a dynamic multidisciplinary team of biomechanists and clinicians, collaborating with federal funding agencies and the biomedical device industry to innovate new devices and

materials for treating vascular pathologies. His team at UNO has amassed one of the world's largest databases of artery biomechanical characteristics, with data from over 2,000 human subjects, and has secured more than \$20 million in funding from sources including the National Institutes of Health, Department of Defense, U.S. Food and Drug Administration, and the private biomedical device industry. His most recent achievement is an \$11 million Center of Biomedical Research Excellence (COBRE) award from the NIH, aimed at developing biomedical research infrastructure and enhancing UNO's capacity for innovative cardiovascular solutions.

OUTSTANDING GRADUATE MENTOR AWARD

Abby Bjornsen-Ramig, Ph.D., is a licensed psychologist in the state of Nebraska and Professor in the Department of Counseling in the College of Education, Health, and Human Sciences. Dr. Bjornsen is senior faculty in the Clinical Mental Health concentration, advising more than 50 graduate students at any given time. She serves as the clinical training director,

which includes establishing and maintaining relationships with community training partners for graduate counseling interns. In addition to instructing and supervising Beginning Practicum, Dr. Bjornsen oversees the UNO Community Counseling Clinic, located in Roskens Hall. Her research and service interests include workplace burnout and infertility in the workplace.

Janelle Beadle, Ph.D., is an associate professor in the Department of Gerontology and the director of the Aging Brain and Emotion Lab. Her research investigates aging-related differences in the psychological, brain, and hormonal bases of empathy and loneliness in healthy aging, Alzheimer's disease, and caregiving. She has published in major journals

in her field, including the *Journal of Gerontology Psychological Sciences and Cognitive, Affective, and Behavioral Neuroscience*. Beadle has been awarded more than \$1.5 million in grant funding to support her research program since coming to UNO. She teaches courses focused on the biology and neuroscience of aging.

Jason D. Coleman, Ph.D., is an associate dean for the College of Education, Health, and Human Sciences and a professor of public health. He remains highly engaged in community-based research and service focused on the prevention and treatment of HIV and other sexually transmitted infections.

He collaborates with federal, state, local, and community organizations to understand and address health disparities and promote health equity. He serves as a councilor for the Council on Education for Public Health, which accredits schools and programs in public health.



MATT GERMONPREZ

MUTUAL OF OMAHA DISTINGUISHED CHAIR OF INFORMATION SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Matt Germonprez is the Mutual of Omaha Distinguished Chair of Information Science & Technology and professor of information systems and quantitative analysis in the College of Information Science & Technology at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. He uses engaged scholarship to research organizational engagement with open-source communities. His research has been funded by several organizations including the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, the Ford Foundation,

the National Science Foundation, the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative, and Mozilla. Germonprez is the co-founder of the Linux Foundation Community Health Analytics OSS Project. He has had work accepted at numerous cross-disciplinary academic journals and conferences. Germonprez is also an active open-source community member, having presented design and development work at professional conferences across the world.



ALEXEY KAMENSKIY
Biomechanics

DEAN'S EXCELLENCE IN RESEARCH PROFESSORSHIP

Alexey V. Kamenskiy, Ph.D., is a professor and chair of the Department of Biomechanics at UNO and the director of the Center for Cardiovascular Research in Biomechanics (CRiB). He earned his Ph.D. in engineering mechanics from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. His research focuses on developing efficient and practical solutions for vascular problems through the study of vascular mechanophysiology, mechanobiology, and aging. Dr. Kamenskiy leads a dynamic multidisciplinary team of biomechanists and clinicians, collaborating with federal funding agencies and the biomedical device industry to innovate new devices and

materials for treating vascular pathologies. His team at UNO has amassed one of the world's largest databases of artery biomechanical characteristics, with data from more than 2,000 human subjects, and has secured more than \$20 million in funding from sources including the National Institutes of Health, Department of Defense, U.S. Food and Drug Administration, and the private biomedical device industry. His most recent achievement is an \$11 million Center of Biomedical Research Excellence (COBRE) award from the NIH, aimed at developing biomedical research infrastructure and enhancing UNO's capacity for innovative cardiovascular solutions.

ORVILLE D. MENARD DISTINGUISHED FACULTY FELLOW

Brett J. Kyle is an associate professor of political science and a faculty member in the Office of Latino/Latin American Studies (OLLAS) and the Goldstein Center for Human Rights. His teaching and research focuses on Latin American politics, democracy, legacies of authoritarianism, and military politics. He

is the author of *Recycling Dictators in Latin American Elections: Legacies of Military Rule* (2016) and co-author, with Andrew G. Reiter, of *Military Courts, Civil-Military Relations, and the Legal Battle for Democracy: The Politics of Military Justice* (2021). His current book project is *State Violence in Democratic Latin America*.

Elizabeth Leader-Janssen, Ph.D., is a professor and chair of the Department of Special Education and Communication Disorders. She teaches graduate literacy methods courses in special education. Her research interests include perceptions of inclusive practices, development of inclusive teaching

programs, and evaluation of online teacher education programs. Her department has developed two new online graduate programs, Accelerated Special Education Program and the Dyslexia Specialist Certificate to meet the needs of schools and communities.

MICHAEL BRUCE JONES, M.D. CHAIR IN THE SCHOOL OF THE ARTS

A Northern Renaissance art historian, Amy Morris has published on Magdalene iconography, artistic self-awareness, and indulgence art. Morris’s research has expanded to encompass curation and instructional design. A member of the Samuel Bak Museum: The Learning Center Advisory Board, she helped coordinate the inaugural Bak exhibition and contributed to its catalog. Reflecting decades of teaching, she created an online study guide for a leading publisher, an open educational

resource, and many online courses. Amy has been active in the medical humanities program as research coordinator and as a participant in the Interdisciplinary Humanities and Arts in Physician Assistant Education project. As director of the School of the Arts she has transitioned into administration and recently was named a Leadership Faculty Fellow. Recently, Morris assumed a leadership role in her profession and was selected as president of the Midwest Art History Society.

GOLDSTEIN FAMILY COMMUNITY CHAIR IN HUMAN RIGHTS

Lana Obradovic, Ph.D., is director of the international studies program, an associate professor of political science and academic director of U.S. Strategic Command’s Strategic Leadership Fellows Program. Obradovic also serves as the academic director of the BOLD Civic Engagement Fellowship program funded by the U.S. Embassies in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Montenegro, and Serbia. She has taught international relations and comparative politics courses for the past 22 years, including 10 at UNO. Her book, *Gender Integration in NATO Military Forces*, won the ERGOMAS 2015 Best

Book in Civil-Military Relations Award. She is also the 2021 UNO Faculty Excellence in Engagement award recipient. Her recent projects include the National Counterterrorism, Innovation, Technology, and Education Center’s research on intelligence training in counterterrorism and NATO’s Integration of Gender Perspectives in Cognitive Warfare to highlight and prevent the use of social media platforms and personalized algorithms to disseminate gendered messages to erode the inclusiveness of democratic societies, and fuel animosity towards gender equality.

DAVID SCOTT DIAMOND PROFESSORSHIP

Tara N. Richards, Ph.D., is the David Scott Diamond Alumni Professor of Public Affairs and Community Service in the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice (SCCJ) and co-director of SCCJ's Victimology and Victim Studies Research Lab. Her research focuses on prevention, intervention, and responses to sexual assault, domestic/intimate partner violence, child abuse, and neglect. She has published more than 100 peer-reviewed journal articles and book chapters and has won more

than \$3 million in competitive grants and contracts to support her research. Richards also coordinates the Nebraska Victim Assistance Academy, the state's accredited 40-hour training certification for victim service providers and allied professionals. She serves on the state's Domestic Violence Intervention Program State Standards Committee, Douglas County's Domestic Violence Community Response Team, and Sexual Assault Response Team.
