

Sign Language Interpreting focuses on training students to teach and support individuals with hearing impairments, emphasizing communication strategies such as American Sign Language (ASL) and auditory-oral techniques. This major prepares educators to create inclusive learning environments to support the educational needs of deaf and hard-of-hearing students.
