Advising checklist of the required courses for the MAJOR:

SPAN 1110: Elementary I	OR	SPAN 1100: Elementary I for Healthcare
SPAN 1120: Elementary II	OR	SPAN 1200: Elementary II for Healthcare
SPAN 2110: Intermediate I		SPAN 2120: Intermediate II

Students with previous language experience can take a placement exam to potentially place out of some or all of the lower level courses listed above depending upon their skill sets.

Heritage Speakers do not take a placement exam and start with a 3000-level course. Contact the department for assistance and placement information.

The major is 30 credit hours (a minimum of 12 at UNO), distributed as follows:

Required language courses (12 credits):

*these courses are for **native** Spanish speakers ONLY*

SPAN 3030: Conversation and Pronunciation

*these courses are for **non-native** Spanish speakers ONLY*

Spanish Course Rotation and Placement

Students with previous language experience can take a placement exam to potentially place out of and receive retroactive credit for some or all of the lower-level courses. Heritage Speakers do not take a placement exam and start with SPAN 3010 or 3020. Contact the department for further assistance and placement information.

There may be courses offered in addition to those indicated below. See the current course offerings or contact an advisor in the Department of Foreign Languages and Literature.

Courses offered every semester:

- Prerequisites: SPAN 1110, SPAN 1120, SPAN 2110, SPAN 2120
- Required 3000-level: SPAN 3010, SPAN 3020, SPAN 3030, SPAN 3040, SPAN 3060
- 3000/4000-level: One course per Track (1, 2 and 3)

Courses offered every spring:

- SPAN 4040: Advanced Spanish Composition (for majors only)

Courses are offered across various modalities, including online, in order to increase accessibility for students.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLO's):

- SLO 1: Aural Comprehension: Students completing the baccalaureate program in foreign languages (concentrating in French, German or Spanish) will be able to listen to and comprehend target-language texts at the Advanced-low level according to the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines or the B1 level according to the Common European Frame of Reference.
- SLO 2: Oral Production: Students completing the baccalaureate program in foreign languages (concentrating in French, German or Spanish) will be able to produce target-language texts at the Advanced-low level according to the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines or the B1 level according to the Common European Frame of Reference.
- SLO 3: Reading Comprehension: Students completing the baccalaureate program in foreign languages (concentrating in French, German or Spanish) will be able to read and comprehend target-language texts at the Advanced-low level according to the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines or the B1 level according to the Common European Frame of Reference.
- SLO 4: Written Production: Students completing the baccalaureate program in foreign languages (concentrating in French, German or Spanish) will be able to take notes, compose cohesive summaries, as well as narratives and descriptions of a factual nature. Target-language writing skills will be at the Advanced-low level according to the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines or the B1 level according to the Common European Frame of Reference.
- SLO 5: Cultural Competency: Students completing the baccalaureate program in foreign languages (concentrating in French, German or Spanish) will be well prepared for intercultural situations and future intercultural learning that occurs beyond the university classroom.

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
