Learn how culture, language, oppression, and other personal and environmental factors contribute to clinically understanding your clients.

Learning Objectives

- Integrate cultural considerations into mental health assessments and diagnosis: recognize how cultural worldviews, trauma, and family dynamics impact the presentation and interpretation of mental health concerns.
- Critically evaluate and adapt standardized assessment tools: identify limitations of scored assessments in cross-cultural contexts and apply culturally responsive approaches to their use.
- Develop culturally informed treatment plans: create client-centered interventions that honor diverse values, traditions, and cultural contexts.
- Enhance cultural humility and clinical practice: reflect on personal biases and demonstrate culturally sensitive communication to build trust and rapport across cultural boundaries.
- Apply advanced diagnostic skills: use a trauma-informed lens to consider the role of intergenerational trauma and family of origin issues in diagnosis and treatment.
