Drew Leisy – Student Body President (Unify UNO)

Please explain why you are running for Student Government.



I am running for Student Government because our campus needs a strong, dedicated leader who truly represents the student body. Over the past year, the defunding of SGA and its Agencies has created significant challenges, creating distrust and inequity among students, representatives, and faculty/administrators. As Student Regent, I am committed to bridging these divides and rebuilding trust. My goal is to ensure that every student—on and off campus—feels heard, valued, and represented. Students are the heart of our university, and as the largest stakeholders, they deserve a leader who will advocate for their interests at both the campus and NU system levels.

Please explain ONE issue that you think you should be changed at UNO.

While there are several pressing issues on campus that I aim to address, one stands out as particularly urgent: the need for a clear and equitable AI policy. Artificial Intelligence tools have become an integral part of modern education, providing students with valuable resources to enhance their learning. However, the lack of a well-defined AI policy has led to confusion and inconsistencies, with students unfairly penalized for utilizing these tools. This issue is significant because it directly impacts academic fairness and students' ability to adapt to evolving technologies. As part of my campaign, I am committed to collaborating with administration to establish a transparent and comprehensive AI policy. My goal is to ensure students can confidently and responsibly use AI without the fear of losing points, while also addressing faculty concerns and maintaining academic integrity. This policy is crucial for empowering students and preparing them for success in a technology-driven future.

Please describe what makes you qualified to sit on Student Government.

Six months ago, I joined SGA as the Director of Finance and was quickly met with challenges, including an audit and defunding within my first six weeks. These obstacles required swift action, and I played a key role in creating the current purchasing plan, which ensures long-term stability for student agencies. My hands-on experience during this time uniquely equips me to address the needs of these agencies. From day one, my mission has been to represent every student on campus. I value every voice and strive to make balanced decisions that benefit the entire student body. As Director of Finance, I also lead the annual Student Budget Activities Commission, where Tier 1 Organizations present their funding requests. Under my leadership, we achieved a historic student fee reduction of \$0.18—the first decrease in nearly two decades—while UNL

recently increased theirs by \$22. At my core, I am dedicated to serving students and ensuring that every decision I make aligns with their best interests and creates a lasting positive impact.

I will work with various departments to ensure no student struggles to receive the support they need to succeed during their time at UNO. But, this is just one piece of a broader issue. There are many resources at UNO that students either struggle to access or don't even know exist. From ensuring that campus shuttles are reliable and accessible to raising awareness about services like free legal services and mental health resources, I want to make sure every student can take full advantage of the support available to them. By working with the necessary stakeholders, I am committed to ensuring that all students can thrive at UNO.

Please describe what makes you qualified to sit on Student Government.

My leadership experience and passion for advocacy make me well-qualified to serve on Student Government. As the current Senator for the College of IS&T, I have worked to create a more supportive and inclusive campus by advocating for student needs. I've helped foster a welcoming environment through events like Messages of Love, fought for equal opportunities for student campus workers, and pushed for DEIA efforts. Please describe what makes you qualified to sit on Student Government.





One thing I would change at UNO is the current parking system, particularly regarding parking pass costs and the availability of parking spaces for both residential and commuter students. As a student living on campus, the high cost of a semester parking pass on top of housing and tuition fees is excessive, especially when it doesn't guarantee reliable access to parking. Dorm residents often struggle to find open spots, particularly during school hours when residential lots are opened to commuter students. This creates a frustrating situation where residents who have paid over \$200 for a permit still find themselves driving around in search of a place to park. This can be especially challenging when students have tight schedules and need guick access to their vehicles for work, classes, or personal commitments. On the other hand, commuter students face their own set of challenges. Many of the parking lots are either restricted, require additional permits, or are designated as non-parking zones, which limits the available options. When these limited spaces fill up quickly, commuters often must park farther from campus or risk parking in areas where they may be ticketed. For students who are trying to balance their schedules, classes, and other responsibilities, this daily struggle to find parking adds unnecessary stress. Another concern is the overall imbalance between the number of parking passes sold and the actual parking capacity. It feels like more permits are issued than there are spots available, which only adds to the frustration for both residents and commuters. This overcrowding not only impacts convenience but also contributes to delays and unnecessary stress throughout the day. Parking is an issue I hear about frequently from students across campus. Whether it's the frustration of paying for a permit but not being able to find a spot, confusion about which lots are accessible, or the inconvenience of walking long distances from the only available parking,

it's a concern that impacts the daily experience of many. It's an issue that students consistently bring up in conversations, highlighting that it's not just an isolated frustration but a widespread challenge faced by the UNO community. One possible solution is capping permit sales to match available spaces and developing a real-time parking app to help students find open spots more easily.


